<u>Walking Group</u>: Our intrepid walkers seem to have had blue skies and sunshine for their outings this autumn (to New Bridge, near Ashburton, to Dawlish Warren, to Exmouth and Budleigh Salterton, and to Topsham. However, the walk round White Cross and the Otter River had its moments, partly due to the heavy flooding of the previous week, but mainly because of an accident to one of the walkers resulting in a broken leg! Walking Group achieves 1000 walkers:

The Group Leader (Trevor Preist) reports that after almost four years and over sixty walks, a sortie into deepest Devon on 19 January produced the 1000th UERSA walker. Prior to the walk the total was 987 and the start was from Landscove – a relatively remote spot off the A38 at Ashburton – left Trevor wondering if they would make it this time. The weather forecast was mixed but most UERSA walkers are not easily deterred and in the end we totalled 15, just getting the Group over the magic number. John Philipson led the group around a very rural and scenic 8 mile route with surprisingly less mud than feared but with some flooded paths. Fortunately these were negotiated without mishap and on returning to Landscove the 1000th walker was determined by 'lot'. Barbara Philipson was delighted to be the chosen one and even more pleased to be presented with a bottle of sparkling wine. The leader of this particular walk (John Philipson) got the reward of some Kendal Mint Cake for bringing the 1000th walker back safely.

Plans for the Spring include walks in the Exe Valley (5 miles), around Crediton via Shobrooke (5 miles), to Moretonhampstead (8 miles), and to Exeter Castle where Bob Higham of the University Archaeology Department will take a guided tour around the Castle.
