If there is enough interest I will arrange a preliminary social where we can discuss how a photography group could work best for us and plan some future events.




FOOD RESEARCH AT THE UNIVERSITY OF EXETER

Participants wanted!

Adequate protein intake is required to prevent the age related loss of muscle mass and its negative health consequences. Due to the growing environmental burden of producing animal-based proteins, more sustainable alternatives are needed. However, the anabolic capacity of these novel non-animal derived proteins sources is unknown yet. Therefore, within Nutritional Physiology we are recruiting healthy older adults (aged 55 – 80) to participate in a study.

The study consists of one screening visit (~1.5h), and six experimental trial visits (~6h each) at St Luke's Campus. During the trial visits, participants will be asked to consume a protein drink and blood will be sampled.

A £150 time and inconvenience allowance will be paid.

Photography and the Geograph Project

Several people in the UERSA walking group have commented that the OS maps that I carry, even when I am not a leader, appear to have measles. They are, it is true, marked with pink dots. Those pink dots are associated with the one kilometre grid-squares of the Ordnance Survey maps, and I use them to show that I have photographed something in that square.

All this is because, since 2005, I have been part of the online Geograph Project. Supported by the OS, this started as a challenge to photograph "something geographical" in each of those grid-squares. Since then it has developed into a document recording the whole of the UK, pictorially. The photographs are online and can be used by anyone else with due acknowledgement - my pictures have been used in books, by estate agents, for educational handouts, etc.

Anyone can join in, although there are very few grid-squares not yet photographed (rocks and sandbanks off the coast which only appear at very low tide and military training areas). Instead, the aim is to develop a comprehensive portrait of the UK; before digital cameras, few amateur photographers recorded street scenes, woodlands and landscapes in detail - film was expensive. The grid-square containing Exeter Cathedral has over 2000 pictures online - and one dedicated photographer has managed to take a picture within each of the 100 smaller grid-squares, each 100metres square!

My contributions cover just over 10,000 grid-squares, from walking, cycling, holidays. For some, I have been the first photographer, others the second or third, or the first person back after a gap of five years or more these things appeal to me as a mathematician! Several UERSA walks have featured as Geograph journeys, where a group of pictures are linked and can be followed in sequence. So, if the proposal for a photography group comes to pass, maybe its members could contribute their pictures to the Geograph website. Meanwhile, I am always hunting for new sites to record - such as the housing estates springing up around the city.

UNIVERSITY OF EXETER IN THE NEWS

Exeter University has been named among the top-ranking English campuses to have asbestos, commonly used in the 1960's, on campus or in student accommodation.

New evidence from experts from Bangor University and Prof Rebecca Probert, an expert in marriage law at the University of Exeter have unearthed evidence of parallels between events at Henry VIII's royal court and the love-life of Edward Griffith of Gwynedd paved the way for copycat divorces.

From 2020, **Dr João Florêncio**, from the department of **Art History and Visual Culture** at the **University of Exeter** has become the first in the UK to offer a module in pornography entitled 'Pornography: Bodies, Sex and representation'

Exeter University's student union was told it owed £269,000 of unpaid taxes and an additional £14,000 in interest, following a review by the HMRC.

The team says it has found evidence that MND is linked to an imbalance of cholesterol and other fats in cells and their research could lead to more accurate diagnosis and new treatments.
