UNIVERSITY OF EXETER IN THE NEWS

Exeter University sexual assaults. Three young men have been arrested after reports of two separate sexual assaults at the University of Exeter. Police were called to Streatham campus during the early hours of Saturday, March 7, to reports of two separate sexual assaults. Two men aged 20 and 21 from Exeter and an 18-year-old man from Leeds were all arrested. They are not students at the university and all three have been released on police bail. (DevonLive, 19 March)

Third year **Politics** student **Maia Thomas** saw a post on Facebook from a young woman asking for food and she decided to take action. Ms Thomas asked what she needed, put together a food package and delivered it within the hour. Others asked for help and she realised there was a large gap to fill. Within the first six weeks Ms Thomas and a team of volunteers delivered more than 2,500 food packages. Maia set up [Feed Our Community](#) to deliver food and emergency gas and electricity top-ups to people in need. Maia managed to get food donations from farmers and independent shops and has now set up deals with supermarkets to get donations and surplus stock. (BBC South West, 22 March)

Ancient international trading routes between Exeter and Europe

Cutting-edge scientific techniques used to study ancient artefacts found in Exeter have revealed more about the ancient international trading routes between the city and Europe.

A five-year research project by a team of archaeologists led by **Professor Stephen Rippon** at the **University of Exeter** shows the links between merchants in Exeter and France, the Low Countries, Spain, Italy, Portugal, and the Mediterranean.

The research project *Exeter: A Place in Time*, is a partnership between the University of Exeter, Cotswold Archaeology, Historic England, Exeter City Council, the Royal Albert Memorial Museum and Art Gallery, and the University of Reading. It was funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council, Historic England and the University of Exeter.

The research is published in two books the first of which - Rippon, S. and Holbrook, N. (2021) *Roman and Medieval Exeter and their Hinterlands: From Isca to Excester* (edited by Stephen Rippon and Neil Holbrook) - is published by [Oxbow books](#).

The companion volume - *Studies in the Roman and Medieval Archaeology of Exeter* (also edited by Stephen Rippon and Neil Holbrook) - is available from [Oxbow Books](#). Both books are available as a [free](#) downloadable PDF and in print form.

Deaths:

Peter Scorer, passed away on 11th September 2020 formerly Lecturer in Russian. Peter was known more widely for possessing a magnificent bass voice which he put to good use, for instance, in the Russian repertoire including the role of the Deacon in Rachmaninov's *Liturgy of St John Chrysostom*, which he recorded twice for the Hyperion and EMI labels as well as performing it locally with the Exeter Festival Chorus.

Lucian Nethsingha, aged 84 on 12th February. Organist and Master of Choristers of Exeter Cathedral from 1973 to 1999. He had been in poor health for some while and latterly had been in a hospice in Cambridge, the city to which he retired.

Although not a member of our University staff, Lucian was known to many through his connections with the University's music activities including his membership of its Music Advisory Group for many years. Some past members of the University Choral Society will also recall singing in a memorable performance of Beethoven's Choral Symphony conducted by Lucian in the Cathedral with the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra.

Emeritus Professor Gar Yates, former Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor of German, distinguished scholar and Fellow of the British Academy since 2002 died 11th March.

Emeritus Professor Eddie Abel, former Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Head of Chemistry, 19th April at the age 78. As well as his work within the University and as the author of books on Organometallic Chemistry, Eddie held distinguished external positions including those of Chair of the Physical Sciences Committee of the old University Grants Committee and, in the late 1990s, of President of the Royal Society of Chemistry. He was awarded a CBE in 1997 for services to Chemistry.

Lynn Hartmann, married to Reinhard, died peacefully on 5 June. Lynn was an MPhil student at the University in her own right in the 1980s and also lectured in the History of Art.

Wednesday 7 July, 10.45am 20 Years of the Jurassic Coast - Dr Anjana Khatwa

Summary: Learning and earth science specialist and TV presenter Dr Anjana Khatwa is an expert on the Jurassic Coast. As a member of the Jurassic Coast World Heritage Site team, she built a sustainable education programme and enabled countless members of the community to engage with this dramatic section of coast. She has appeared many times on BBC and ITV programmes talking about geology with recent appearances on BBC CountryFile. Her own TV documentaries How the Earth was Made and Fossil Detectives were highly acclaimed. Her talk will give an overview of the World Heritage Site, celebrating 20 years since its designation. She will provide insights into the geology and scenery of this amazing section of coast, supported with spectacular photographic images.

Biography: Dr Anjana Khatwa is an award-winning acclaimed Earth Scientist, engagement specialist and TV presenter. She worked for the Jurassic Coast World Heritage Site for 15 years developing and managing the strategic education programme. She was awarded the prestigious RH Worth Medal in recognition of her outstanding education and engagement work in the geosciences by the Geological Society of London in 2021. She is passionate about science and inspiring those around her, particularly girls and young women, to choose science as a career. She currently works freelance as a TV presenter, writer and expert adviser for factual programmes, and is Wessex Museums Engagement Lead for the Wessex Museums Trust.

Wednesday 21 July, 10.45am

The History of Mount Batten, Plymouth - Dr Robin Blythe-Lord

Summary: Mount Batten is a small peninsula in the Northeast corner of Plymouth Sound. It forms a natural breakwater to the Cattewater, Plymouth's original port and has a story dating from Neolithic times. Robin will take us rapidly through its history and development, pausing en-route to examine various items of interest, scandal and mystery.

Biography: Robin Blythe-Lord enjoyed a long career as a teacher, working both in the UK and abroad, finishing his teaching career as Principal Lecturer in the Faculty of Art and Design at Manchester Metropolitan University. Having been always interested in aspects of local history, he has contributed articles and papers to various journals, hosted TV and radio programmes and written books, the most recent being *The Story of Langdon Court*. Robin is now retired and living in Plymouth. He divides his time between shouting at the television, being Chairman of Plym Valley Heritage, being instrumental in getting his local green area designated as a village green, and researching the photographers of Plymouth. He is also a past Trustee of Devon Historic Buildings. Why Mount Batten? It has a fascinating history and is just around the corner from where he lives!

Wed 4 August, 10.45am

Art and the Industrial Revolution - Tony Kirby

In this talk Tony Kirby will explore how contemporaries portrayed and reacted to the unprecedented economic and social changes that Britain experienced between 1750 and 1900. Down to the 1790s these were seen as beneficial: providing employment and illustrating man's increasing control of his environment. Industrial subjects lent themselves well to prevailing ideas of the 'sublime' and the 'picturesque'. By 1800, doubts were creeping in, particularly with the growth of industrial towns. Portrayals of industry adopted a correspondingly gloomy note. This was relieved by the coming of the railways, which were seen as an unalloyed source for optimism, only for doubts to creep in again towards the end of Victorian period with a series of disasters (notably the fall of the Tay Bridge in 1879). The talk will conclude with a quick glance at what the late Victorians thought should be the future, as exemplified by William Morris and then the Garden City Movement.

Biography: Tony is making a welcome return to the Forum programme. Until his retirement, Tony Kirby was Co-ordinator of Strategic & Curriculum Planning at Anglia Ruskin University, having previously been Principal Lecturer in History. He is a past President of the Cambridge Antiquarian Society and Chair of the Cambridgeshire Records Society, and is currently Secretary of the Cambridgeshire Association for Local History and the County Advisory Group on Archives and Local Studies. He was joint editor of *An Atlas of Cambridgeshire and Huntingdonshire History* (2000) and is the author of *Anglia Ruskin University, 1858 – 2008: A Celebratory History* (2008). He contributed a chapter on 'Railways and Towns' to *How Railways Changed Britain* (ed David St John Thomas) (2015). He has also written several commentaries on early 20th century 25" Ordnance Survey maps for Alan Godfrey Editions, most recently, *Brentwood* (1916), *Halstead* (1921) and *Forest Gate and Plaistow* (both 1939). Apart from transport (especially railways) and resorts, his historical interests lie in market towns and the social history of religion in England since the Reformation.

Wed 25 August, 10.45am
The work of the Commonwealth War Graves
Commission - Rebecca Smith

Summary: The Commonwealth War Graves Commission is responsible for commemorating over 1.7 million men and women from across the Commonwealth who died in World War One and World War Two. With graves and memorials in around 150 countries and territories across the world, many sites were designed by world-renowned architects, sculptors and artists, and several are world heritage sites. This talk will look at the formation and development of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and its relevance in the 21st Century, using examples from different parts of the world. It will then focus on how the sites are conserved and maintained, in particular the importance of caring for the sites, including their monuments, landscapes and gardens.

Biography: This talk has been arranged by Rebecca Smith, CWGC Public Engagement Coordinator (South West). The talk will be given either by herself, or another member of the CWGC Public Engagement Team in the South West. The Commissions Public Engagement Team are responsible for working with local groups across the country to raise the profile of the work of the CWGC through school visits, talks, tours and events.

Using Links to Zoom Meetings and
Recordings

We have found that on some devices and systems it is not possible to just click on the link provided to join Zoom meetings and on these you may have to use one of the following methods.

- 1. Copy and paste the link into your browser.*
- 2. If you are using Windows mail you may find that the link is shown in grey rather than blue and when you click on the link it displays a message saying it cannot open the link. If this happens you can try the following :
(a) Launch the Zoom app. Click on the home icon and click on JOIN. Enter the meeting ID.
OR (b) Make Microsoft Edge your default browser. Restart your device.*

This should have fixed the problem and if you don't like Edge as your default browser you can change the default back to the one you want and restart the device.

Full details of the talk and the link to join the Zoom meeting will be included in the Exeter Forum News prior to the talk and a separate reminder with the link will be emailed on the day before the talk.
