General Notes

<u>Art Exhibition</u>: a major exhibition of the prints of Lucien Freud is taking place in the Northcote House Gallery from April 23rd to June 6th. There is a splendid illustrated guide to the Exhibition available.

<u>Groups</u>: Some of our Groups are getting very big, and we may have to think of ways to split them up into more manageable numbers. <u>Personal Notes</u>: It is with great sadness we report the death on 15th February of **Dr Peter Uzzell**, and on the 23rd of March that of **Dr Norma Perry**. **Peter Uzzell** was a Lecturer in the Department of Education at Thornlea, appointed in 1964. He was responsible for the chemistry element within the PGCE course. He retired as Senior Lecturer from the School of Education, St Luke's in 1991. He was also Director of the St Luke's College Foundation from 1986 to 1996. **Norma Perry** worked for many years in the Department of French, as a Lecturer and later as Reader, one of only two women in the Department for some time. Her research work concentrated particularly on Voltaire in England. We have also just learned that **Dr Donald Haggis**, also of the French Department, died recently at the age of 94.
