# FROM THE UNIVERSITY NEWSLETTER

## **REF 2021 results**

The Research Excellence Framework (REF) 2021 results have been published. The REF is a national evaluation of the UK's research base.

The results show that we've seen a significant growth in both quantity and quality of our research, with the number of researchers submitted increasing by 70% (from 736 to 1,251 full time equivalent), and the proportion of our research assessed as world-leading (4\*) growing by more than 60%. The results place us 18th in the UK for research power, up from 21st. More than 99% of our research is of international quality (4\* + 3\* + 2\*), with 89% assessed as internationally excellent (4\* + 3\*) and 46.9% as world-leading (4\*), up from 29% in REF 2014.

## **The University is looking at its brand - be part of the change**

Following the creation of our Strategy 2030, we now want to take this opportunity to review our University brand and visual identity to ensure this supports the delivery of our strategic goals for the next decade. A new visual identity must support and enable us to grow our global networks and connections, and help us to reach new audiences, as well as ensuring that internally we foster pride in our institution and our collective goals for

the future. We want all colleagues, students and alumni to get involved and be part of our rebrand journey so that together we can get the most from our University brand.

## **Lady Mireille Gillings opens our Neuroimaging Centre**

Global business leader and philanthropist Lady Mireille Gillings, PhD, Hon DSc, officially opened the cutting-edge new imaging centre which bears her name on International Women's Day, last Tuesday (8 March). The opening of the Centre was followed by a reception hosted by our Vice-Chancellor, Professor Lisa Roberts. Our Medical School's new Mireille Gillings Neuroimaging Centre was funded by part of a £10 million donation from the Dennis and Mireille Gillings Foundation. The gift also funded three Mireille Gillings Fellows in Health Innovation, supporting female academics in leadership roles. Two years on, each of the three Fellows appointed is in a senior leadership position.

# Obituaries:

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Barrie Behenna, whom many across the University will have got to know during his long service to the institution, died on 10 March at the age of 84. Barrie joined the University's central academic administration in 1962 and progressed in time to the senior administrative role of Secretary of Faculties, finally retiring as Academic Secretary in 1997. His work for the University did not quite finish then, as into the early 2000s he worked on its behalf with some part-time international duties.

Beyond his administrative responsibilities, Barrie took a particular interest in developing Exeter's links with the military. He was instrumental in the establishment of the University Officer Training Corps and acted as secretary to the Military Education Committee. He also set up the Defence Studies Dining Club which, for a time, was an important link between the University, the military and the City and County. And, for something completely different, he was wicket-keeper for the largely academic staff Erratics cricket team!

Barrie was an enthusiastic member of UERSA from its inception and served as its President in 2007-8.

Outside of the University, Barrie had many interests as a volunteer, most notably with the local Health Authority, the local work of the Multi-Centre Medical Research Ethics Committee, the Step One Charity, and the Teignmouth RNLI.

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UERSA owes a huge debt to Jan Reynolds who sadly died at the age of 81 on 13 March. Jan was one of the people who were instrumental in setting up the Association in 2004 and, indeed, was the very first secretary of its Executive Committee. Bruce Coleman has observed that, 'Without her grasp of the power politics in Northcote House, I'm not sure that we would have succeeded in overcoming the obstacles that were being put in our way.' Many members will recall that over the years that followed, Jan, with the help of husband Mike, organised the annual quiz and the monthly coffee mornings at the Imperial, always with a merry smile and warm welcome. And nothing was too much trouble for her in providing assistance for other UERSA events.

Jan joined the University at the end of the 1970s, providing secretarial services for successive Directors of Buildings & Estate (Don Riches and Andrew Tait) based in Northcote House, later working for Sue Odell before transferring to the office of the Director of Personnel.

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We are sorry to report that Adrian Davey, whom many of us knew as a very helpful and affable member of the Finance Office, has died. Adrian was one of the 'friendly faces' in Northcote House, always ready to explain the intricacies of the finances to HoDs. He was generous with his time and help.
